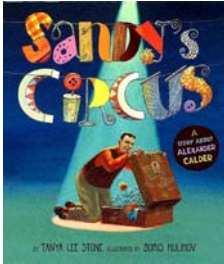

Sandy's Circus: a Story about Alexander Calder by Tania Lee Stone

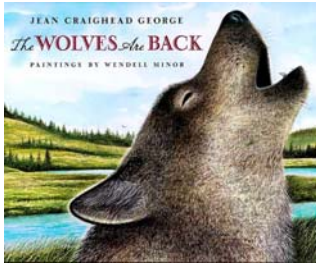
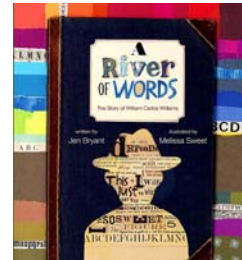
AR Level: 3.6 -- 32 pages

AR Level: 4.6 -- 34 pages

The Wolves are Back by Lynn Craighead George

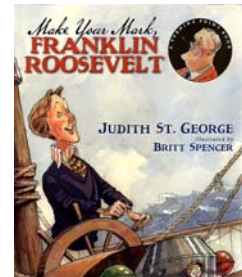
AR Level 3.6 -- 32 pages

Profiles the childhood and adolescent years of President Franklin Roosevelt describing the many influences he had on his life and political career.



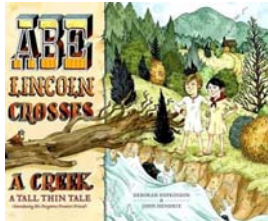
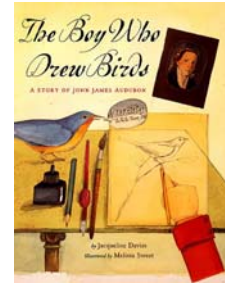
Actual Size by Steve Jenkins

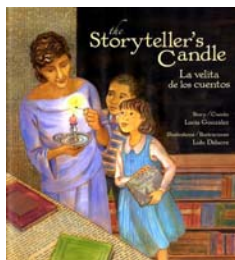
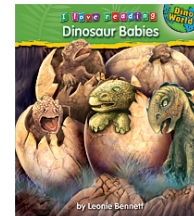


***Abe Lincoln Crosses a Creek: a Tall, Thin Tale* by Deborah

AR Level: 3.1 -- 36 pages**

In Knob Creek, Kentucky, in 1816, seven-year-old Abe Lincoln falls into a creek and is rescued by his best friend, Austin Gollaher.

***Dinosaur Babies* by Leonie Bennett
AR Level: 2.2 -- 24 pages**

Illustrations and simple text describe how baby dinosaurs were born and how they found food to survive.

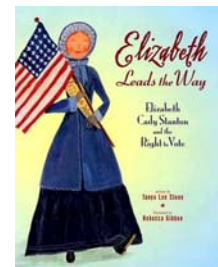


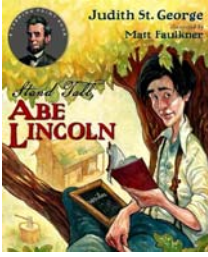
***The Storyteller's Candle* by Lucia Gonzalez

During the early days of the Great Depression, New York City's first Puerto Rican librarian, Pura Belpre, introduces the public library to immigrants living in El Barrio and hosts the neighborhood's first Three Kings' Day fiesta. Presented in English and Spanish.

A brief biography of the life and achievements of nineteenth-century women's rights activist, Elizabeth Cady Stanton, who fought for a woman's right to vote





***Stand Tall, Abe Lincoln* by Eve Bunting**

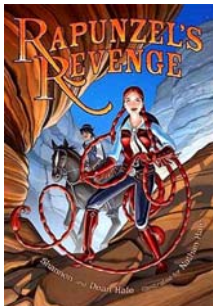
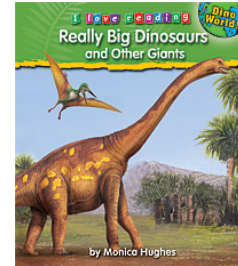
AR Level: 4.1 -- 48 pages

An illustrated account of the early life of Abraham Lincoln in the backwoods of Kentucky and Indiana, discussing how the support and encouragement of his stepmother Sally Johnston propelled him to success.

***Really Big Dinosaurs and Other Giants* by Monica Hughes**

AR Level 2.4 -- 24 pages

Illustrations and simple text introduce young readers to some of the biggest, strongest, tallest, and heaviest dinosaurs that roamed the earth.



***Rapunzel's Revenge* by Shannon Hale**

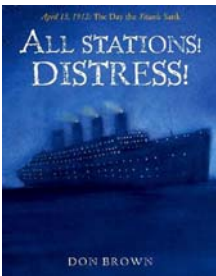
AR Level 3.2 -- 144 pages

Rapunzel, having grown up in a lovely castle with the woman she thought was her mother, is placed in a very tall hollow tree as punishment after her curiosity prompts her to climb the castle wall and look at the ruin of the world beyond her home, but she is able to escape and with the help of Jack, embarks on a plan to free the land from the grip of the witch.

***Nic Bishop Frogs* by Nic Bishop**

AR Level 4.8 -- 48 pages

Full-color, illustrated photographs describing the characteristics and behaviors of a variety of frogs around the world.



***All Stations! Distress! April 15, 1912, the Day the Titanic Sank* by Don Brown**

AR Level 5.4 -- unpagged

Presents an illustrated account of the Titanic's deadly voyage on April 12, 1912, when two thousand passengers, rich and poor alike, fought to survive the tragedy while partially filled lifeboats launched into the night with seven hundred people as some family members stayed behind.
